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# TOBACCO FACTS for SCIOTO COUNTY

(updated 1/6/2022)

#### **Smoking Cases Early Death!**

- Smoking is the #1 cause of early preventable death in the U.S. 1
- About 1 in 3 cases of cancer is caused by tobacco use.<sup>3</sup>
- Smokers are 4 times as likely to die of heart disease than non-smokers. 11
- Smokers are 25 times as likely to die of lung cancer than non-smokers. 11
- Smokers are 12 times as likely to die of COPD than non-smokers. 11
- Life expectancy for smokers is at least 10 years shorter than for non-smokers. 1

### Scioto County has High Rates of Smoking and Cancer!

- 1 in 4 (25%) of adults in Scioto County smoke, compared to 19.3% in Ohio and 17% in the U.S. 4,14
- Scioto County has a higher cancer incidence rate (494.5 cases per 100,000 people) than Ohio (461.6) or the U.S. (439.2) <sup>3</sup>
- Scioto County has a higher cancer mortality rate (196.4 deaths per 100,000) than Ohio (178.9) or the U.S. (163.5) <sup>3</sup>

### **Smoking Hurts Babies and Children!**

- Smoking during pregnancy increases risk for stillbirth, pre-term delivery, low birth weight, sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS), and cleft lip/cleft palate <sup>11</sup>
- Tobacco smoke contains over 7000 chemicals. Over 700 are toxic and over 70 cause cancer. 12
- If you smoke around kids, they can inhale the equivalent to 102 packs of cigarettes by age 5. 12
- Secondhand smoke causes more frequent and severe asthma attacks, ear infections, bronchitis, and pneumonia in children. 12

#### **Tobacco Addiction Starts Early!**

- On average, Ohio children try smoking for the first time at age 12-1/2 years.
- Over 40% of Ohio high school students have tried e-cigarettes.
- Over 90% of adult smokers started smoking before age 18.

### Smoking Is Expensive!

- A 1-pack-a-day smoker in Scioto County spends over \$2800/year on cigarettes. Over 20 years, this adds up to over \$57,000!
- 15% of Medicaid costs are attributed to cigarette smoking. <sup>10</sup>
- 46% of working-age Ohio Medicaid enrollees are current smokers.
- Cutting smoking by just 1% per year could save Ohio taxpayers \$60 million/year. 10

## Want to Quit? Help is Available!

- Most adult smokers (almost 7 in 10) say they want to guit. <sup>13</sup>
- Medicaid programs in Ohio cover smoking-cessation medications.
